Strawn Recognized for Community Achievement by KTB

After competing for the first time in the Keep Texas Beautiful Governor's Community Achievement Awards, Strawn placed third and was recognized with an "Award of Excellence" for receiving a score of 90 or higher. The Strawn Chamber of Commerce applied for this prestigious statewide program due to all the clean-up and beautification projects undertaken in the past year. Competing in the Category 1 division (communities with populations up to 3,000), the first place winner was awarded a \$90,000 grant. Utopia won the 1st place award, Aubrey placed 2nd, and Strawn placed 3rd, finishing ahead of seven other communities. In applying for the award, Strawn was required to document

Texas Forts Trails Co-Hosts Tour of New State Park

Margaret Hoogstra, Executive Director of the Texas Forts Trail, and John Ferguson, Palo Pinto Mountains State Park Superintendent, co-hosted 39 park visitors on Tuesday, May 13. The guests first met for breakfast at Mahachek's Bakery before touring the east side of Palo Pinto Mountains State Park and Lake Tucker. The group lunched at Mary's Café and resumed the tour by seeing the west end of the park, as well as the newly acquired acreage that has been purchased recently. The visitors came from across the state and includ-

ed Chamber representatives from Possum Kingdom, Mineral Wells, Eastland, Ballinger, Wichita Falls, and Abilene. The Executive Directors from the other Texas Historic Trails also participated in the tour, as did representatives from organizations such as Texas Midwest Community Network, Erath County Historical Commission, Abilene State Park, and Buffalo Gap Historic Village. The Texas Forts Trail Region is comprised of 29 counties in Central West Texas, and Strawn is included on the Texas Forts Trail. It is one of the ten trails of

the Texas Heritage Trails Program, which is the Texas Historical Commission's (THC) award-winning heritage tourism initiative. This economic development initiative encourages communities, heritage regions, and the state to partner with each other to promote Texas' historic and cultural resources. Local preservation efforts, combined with statewide marketing of heritage regions as tourism destinations, increase visitation to cultural and historic sites and bring more dollars to Texas communities. This in turn supports the THC's mission

to protect and preserve the state's historic and prehistoric resources for the use, education, economic benefit, and enjoyment of present and future generations.

Historic Strawn Train Depot Comes Back Home

After being sold and moved from Strawn in the late 1970's, the historic Strawn train depot arrived home on May 17, 2014. The Strawn Historical Museum Board of Directors has worked for almost two years to relocate the depot from Oakdale (near Stephenville) to its present location at Memorial Park across from the railroad tracks.

The depot was first moved to Thurber next to the Smokestack Restaurant, where it remained for several years. It was later bought and moved to Oakdale where the warehouse portion of the depot was used as part of the Oakdale Steakhouse, owned and operated by Todd Fanning. The office portion of the depot (with ticket windows and waiting rooms) was placed in a field next to the owner's house. After contacting the owner in the fall of 2012 and learning that he

was willing to donate the depot to Strawn, the Museum Board began raising money and planning its return.

Much of Strawn's early history centers around the railroad. Stephen Bethel Strawn, for whom the city of Strawn was named, laid off his property for the new town in 1879 and

other essential products, thus encouraging new business ventures. The railroad also brought in immigrants to work in the coal mines and thriving coal industry in the area, which further spurred the growth of Strawn.

In May 1976, long-time railroad depot agent Jim Chesnut ended 27 years

troop and supply trains. Chesnut also recalled the decline of passenger trains, noting that passenger service to Strawn ended sometime during the 1950s. Other former depot agents included Bud Tucker and David L. Lindsay (grandfather of resident Shirley Lindsay).

Long-time Strawn residents fondly recall memories of the depot, such as riding the passenger trains to other cities, picking up freight deliveries, and riding bikes on the depot ramp. Becky Lenoir, whose father worked for the railroad for 44 years, commented that "the depot has come back home, where it belongs. The railroad and depot are a very important part of Strawn's history, and this is a project to be proud of."

The relocated depot will be a restoration project by the Strawn Historical Museum. Short-term plans



1880. According to historical accounts, he gave every other block to the Texas and Pacific Railroad to encourage the company to bring their rails through the new settlement. After the Texas and Pacific Railway Company rolled into Strawn on July 4, 1880, the town began to develop. The coming of the railroad brought supplies of lumber, feed, and

as the Strawn depot agent when Texas and Pacific Railroad decided to close the depot. Interviewed by the Strawn Reporter News in May 1976, Chesnut recalled the movement of men and materials on the Texas and Pacific line during World War II. He and other area depot agents would often work through the night to relay instructions to the 500-passenger

are to repair the outside (clean, paint, replace broken windows and rotten/missing boards), with long-term plans to restore the inside of the depot and eventually display donated items pertaining to the Strawn railroad and depot.

The Museum received a \$10,000 grant to help with the cost of moving the depot, along with donations from others. A special thank you goes out to everyone who sent donations or contributed to the donation jars that were placed around town

to raise money for moving the depot. The Strawn Historical Museum Board is unsure of the exact date the depot was built and is seeking more information about its history. If anyone has pictures, articles, or information to share about

some impressive statistics relative to Palo Pinto County and the region. The information is derived from the 2012 Annual Report (the most recent, complete report) issued by the Governor's Office of Economic Development and Tourism.

- In 2012 alone, direct travel spending in Palo Pinto County totaled \$84,400,000. This includes dollars spent on lodging, dining, recreation, etc.
- In 2012, tourism created 641 jobs in Palo Pinto County.
- Local tax receipts totaled \$692,300. (This is the amount of tourism-related taxes collected locally in

Palo Pinto County)

- State tax receipts totaled \$4,705,000. (This amount reflects taxes collected by the State of Texas as a result of tourism in Palo Pinto County)

- In comparison to the six counties surrounding it, Palo Pinto County was second only to Parker County in the amount of tourism revenue that was generated.

During the presentation, Ms. Hoogstra suggested that every community needs to have something that is authentic and contagious to promote tourism. She further noted that Strawn has a wonderful asset with the state park.

Electric Rates are Simmering Public Notice & Friendly Reminder as Summer Heats Up!

With summer quickly approaching and temps getting hotter, it's an opportune time to check your electricity rates to make certain you're getting the best deal and cheapest rates available. Since the deregulation of electricity in Texas in 2002, Texans have had the choice to choose their electricity provider. To check the latest published rates and list of providers, go to www.powertochoose.org. You will be asked to enter your zip code (ex. 76475). You can further narrow your search by answering three questions concerning Usage, Types of Plans and duration. To make it easier, have your current electric bill and if possible, an electric bill from last summer available so that you can compare the kilowatt hours (kWh) used during peak usage and the rate you pay currently. In many electric plans, the rates will vary based on usage so read the plans carefully.
